PROJECT OVERVIEW:

This program will support comprehensive tobacco prevention and control efforts in several goal areas, the TPC program intends to fund local and regional organizations (e.g. community-based organizations, healthcare systems and schools) to implement comprehensive, evidence-based tobacco prevention and control strategies that change community rules, norms, attitudes and practices around tobacco use. HVHC will utilize several strategies including peer-to-peer mentoring, assessment of curriculum and existing needs of chosen populations, smoke-free events, media campaigns and public outreach. The first year of the project will focus on a needs assessment for the chosen populations and will evaluate the effectiveness and the relevance of existing school curriculums and materials aimed at tobacco prevention and control. The year 2 action plan will be based on the results of Year one data and will be developed following the assessment in year one.

#### PROJECT OVERVIEW:

The aims of this project are to raise awareness among the larger community about the dangers of sharing medications and the risks of overprescribing to young adults. This project also aims to bring prescription drug misuse prevention activities and education to schools, communities, parents, prescribers, and their patients. Overall the PFS grant is intended to reduce the number of prescription drug/opioid overdose-related deaths and related adverse events among people ages 18 and older. The coalition participates in many of the activities associated with recovery, prevention, and treatment of substance misuse, including drug take back events, Red Ribbon Week, Recovery Month activities, media campaigns, trainings, and other activities designed to engage the community.

#### PROJECT OVERVIEW:

This project is targeted at improving the mental of youth and young adults in the Anchorage area. HVHC in conjunction with Anchorage Collaborative Coalition – ACC works to increase awareness and to grow the number of community members who have a better understanding of bullying and the consequences. The coalition also works to Increase the baseline percentage of community members who are aware of the available resources for those suffering from or witnessing adult bullying in the Anchorage bowl. HVHC coalition members have been trained in safe "bystander intervention" strategies, and participants/Youth Ambassadors involved in this project are now able to "train-the-trainer" and help others to spread the knowledge across the Anchorage area. These trainings are now conducted in a variety of settings such as schools, churches, workplaces, and any setting where bullying might occur. HVHC has created the "Start the Conversation" kit to help promote discussion around bullying and information on available resources. The coalition hosts community events like "Family Night," "Father-Daughter Ball, and the "Mother-Son Gala. The work of the larger coalition is focus on increasing protective factors and lowering ACES scores across the Anchorage area.

## **ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:**

Healthy Voices, Healthy Choices, with Volunteers of America Alaska conducts the Alaska Emerging YOUth Leadership Academy each summer. The week-long training program is for youth ages 13-24 years old and their designated adult mentors. The academy is designed to provide an in-depth understanding of leadership qualities, prevention strategies (i.e. alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, prescription medications), social issues (i.e. suicide, bullying, homelessness) and effective advocacy skills (i.e. public speaking, media literacy, community assessment and evaluations). The peer-to-peer approach and the importance of creating connection within communities remains a primary goal of the leadership academy. The training provides youth and young adults with the opportunity to take action, develop effective messaging, and make a difference in their home communities. The materials and sessions are developed using data driven information, and HVHC aims to incorporate best practices that lead to increasing protective factors and positive community change.
